Title: "Wh-the-hell phrases, discourse linking, and domain ignorance"

Abstract: So-called "aggressively non-D-linked" interrogative phrases, such as what the hell, what on earth, etc., have received relatively little attention in the literature on the semantics of wh-questions. The most prominent analysis is that of den Dikken & Giannakidou (2002), who argue that these wh-the-hell phrases are polarity items and derive their distribution and various properties, including an inability to be discourse linked or remain insitu, from this. In this talk, I argue against the polarity analysis on empirical grounds and propose a tentative alternative analysis based on the speaker's ignorance of the set from which the possible answers can be drawn. I try to derive their resistance to discourse-linking (and some evident exceptions to this), their unique incompatibility with which, their preference for kind expressions over other nouns, and their inability to appear in-situ from this ignorance requirement. I will also present some previously undiscussed syntactic data involving whellipsis, or wh-questions without wh-words, involving these the-hell phrases.
